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New Poll Findings: Americans Strongly Support Extending SCHIP to More Children President's Veto Threat Out of Touch With Public

WASHINGTON --- The vast majority of American voters strongly support extending State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) coverage to more uninsured children, according to a nationwide poll released today by Georgetown University's Center for Children and Families. This is the first poll to ask voters about much debated issues --- such as covering parents and higher income children --- arising in the SCHIP reauthorization debate. With 9 million children lacking health insurance, the public believes Congress should take action to cover more children.

In the nationwide poll conducted by a bipartisan team of pollsters, Lake Research Partners and American Viewpoint, 91 percent of Americans said that they want Congress to help states cover more uninsured children and the vast majority also supported covering uninsured parents in low-income working families. Voter support for SCHIP crosses party lines, according to the poll results.

"These poll results indicate that the American public considers health care coverage for our nation's children a number one priority," said Center for Children and Families Executive Director Cindy Mann. "Voters are looking to Congress and President Bush to help move the nation forward - not backward - in covering uninsured families."

On each of the key issues in the SCHIP debate, the poll revealed that voters are in a very different place from the President. The bipartisan survey showed that American voters support:

- Continuing to allow states to decide which children to cover: Nearly two-thirds of the public favors continuing to allow states to decide the income levels of the children who can be covered by SCHIP, including majorities of Republicans (61 percent), Independents (64 percent), and Democrats (68 percent).
- Continuing to allow SCHIP to cover low-income, working uninsured parents of children enrolled in SCHIP: Eighty-four percent of the public favors allowing low-income, uninsured working parents of children in SCHIP to be covered by the program when they do not have coverage through their job, including 75 percent of Republicans, 87 percent of Independents, 88 percent of Democrats.
