## Kaiser Brief on New Rules for States Determining Income for CHIP and Medicaid in 2014

A new issue brief released by the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured explains the new rules governing the way that states will have to determine eligibility for Medicaid and CHIP starting in 2014. The brief explains the changes in how income and household size are defined to determine eligibility for those programs and the exchange premium credits. It also describes the differences between the new rules and current income counting rules used in Medicaid and CHIP. Please go here to read the brief.

## New Paper on Importance of Medicaid for Children and Other Vulnerable Populations

As many of you probably know, there is an ongoing debate in Washington, D.C. that could result in some significant cuts and drastic changes to Medicaid. To help better understand the implications of what these cuts could mean, First Focus commissioned a study by researchers at George Washington University. The report describes the enormous success of Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in increasing health insurance coverage among children and explores the potential impact of the fiscal year 2012 budget resolution which calls for turning Medicaid into a block grant program.
