- 1. This table indicates whether the state has received approval of a State Plan Amendment to adopt the option to cover immigrant children and/or pregnant women who have been lawfully residing in the U.S. for less than five years, otherwise known as the ICHIA option.
- 2. DC, Illinois, New York, and Washington cover all children, regardless of immigration status.
- 3. DC and New Jersey cover all immigrant pregnant women, regardless of immigration status. In 2012, Pennsylvania and Virginia received CMS approval of their State Plan Amendment to provide coverage to lawfully-residing pregnant women without the five-year wait.
- 4. In California, some local programs cover immigrant children regardless of legal status.
- 5. Colorado passed legislation authorizing coverage of lawfully residing immigrant children in 2012, but has not provided funding for the expansion.
- 6. Illinois is awaiting approval of a State Plan Amendment to cover lawfully-residing immigrant children in CHIP; the state already covers these children in Medicaid.
