States have been asked to separate out disabled children from their total child counts; disabled children counts are then included in the elderly and disabled category. Most states are able to break out that data. In 2 states (IL and WI) some estimation is required due to differences in report totals to determine the number of non-disabled children. The raw data for California does not break out non-disabled children. To make this measure comparable to other states, the ratio of all non-disabled children to all non-elderly non-disabled adults from an earlier time period (when the data was broken out) was applied to the nonelderly nondisabled group. Additionally, there are a relatively small number of enrollees for whom their eligibility pathway was not identified by the state. These individuals were included in the non-elderly adult counts unless they were clearly identified as children.
