- 1. "Waiting period" refers to the length of time a child is required to be uninsured prior to enrolling in health coverage. They generally apply to separate CHIP programs only, unless otherwise noted, as waiting periods are not permitted in Medicaid without a waiver. Exceptions to the waiting period vary by state. In addition to the income exemptions shown, specific categories of children (for example, newborns or children with special health care needs) and those with job loss or "unaffordable" coverage may also be exempt from the waiting periods.
- 2. In Arkansas, the waiting period only applies to those covered under the 1115 waiver
- 3. Under CHIP, Illinois imposes a 3-month waiting period for those between 133% and 200% FPL; however, the state funds provide coverage during the period. They also have a 12-month waiting period in their state-funded coverage between 200% and 300% FPL.
- 4. In July 2012, Minnesota eliminated its waiting period for kids covered under the MinnesotaCare waiver between 150% and 200% of the FPL. Those above 200% of the FPL are still subject to the 4-month waiting period.
- 5. New Hampshire eliminated its 6-month waiting period for CHIP when it converted its combination CHIP program to a Medicaid expansion in July 2012.
- 6. Oklahoma has a 6-month waiting period in its Insure Oklahoma premium assistance program.
