The Census Bureau provides the following categories of coverage for respondents to indicate source of health insurance: current or former employer, purchased directly from an insurance company, Medicare, Medicaid or means-tested public coverage (includes CHIP), TRICARE/military health coverage, VA health care, Indian Health Service (IHS), or other. Individuals who indicate IHS as their only source of health coverage do not have comprehensive coverage and are considered to be uninsured. The congressional district boundaries represent those that were in effect for the 114th Congress.
