Voices for Virginia's Children

- We champion public policies that improve the lives of VA's children, especially in areas of:
 - Child welfare and foster care
 - Mental health and health
 - Early care and education
 - Family economic success
 - Childhood trauma and resilience
- Privately funded, nonprofit, nonpartisan
- Data and research on children's well-being:
 KIDS COUNT



The Role of Voices for Virginia's Children

- Neutral convener- no public funds
- Recognize the continuum-- prenatal through adulthood-- and the comprehensive nature of early childhood
- Develop a unified voice and help shape message
- Build awareness through electoral advocacy



How did we get started?

 Policy analyst with academic and professional background in early childhood mental health

- Voices long history of leading coalitions and developing unified policy agendas:
 - Campaign for Children's Mental Health
 - Early childhood unified policy agenda
 - CHIP Reauthorization



How did we get started?

- Collaboration with Virginia Early Childhood Mental Health Coordinator: Bonnie Grifa
- Since 2011, Virginia has taken steps to build an early childhood mental health system
 - Established the Infant Mental Health Endorsement System in Virginia
 - Established Early Childhood Mental Health Virginia Advisory Board
 - Annual Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health Institute

*But key players (Medicaid & Behavioral Health) were frequently missing from the table



Policy Opportunities that have helped move the needle

- NCCP's 50-state survey
- Zero to Three IECMH Financing Policy Project: Cohort 1 2016-2017
 - Allowed us to build a cross-agency state leadership team
 - Provided an opportunity for agency leaders to learn about ECMH concepts, best practices, barriers to services
 - Obtained data specific to mental health services and children 0-5 for the first time
 - Mapped out Medicaid reimbursable services available to young children in Virginia



Identifying Medicaid Levers and Navigating Political Opportunities

- Medallion 4.0 carves in early intervention (Part C) services and community-based mental health services
 - ECMH language included in MCO RFP and model contract

- Behavioral health transformation of Medicaid services: redesigned continuum of services starting at the "beginning of life"
 - "early intervention" should include early childhood mental health/parent-child therapy
 - integration of primary and behavioral health services



Navigating Political Challenges and Opportunities

- One term Governor: creates challenges and opportunities for advocates
- Priorities change with each new administration, requiring advocates to be nimble, patient and creative
- Building relationships with the Administration and Medicaid staff is key to change
- Know your audience: adjust your communication depending on the audience.
