# **GEORGIA** Latino Children's Health Coverage Facts

State officials' decisions about coverage options, especially in times of crises, have a profound effect on children and can exacerbate pre-existing racial and ethnic disparities. In Georgia, the uninsured rate for children overall is higher than the national average (8.1% vs. 5.2%). Additionally, Latino children are 2.5 times as likely to be uninsured than other children in the state (16.5% vs. 6.6%). Expanding Medicaid and removing barriers to Medicaid and PeachCare for Kids enrollment would help reduce this disparity.



# **Medicaid and Latino Kids**

While Medicaid and PeachCare for Kids (CHIP) are important sources of coverage for all children in Georgia, they are especially important for Latino children. Latino families have a higher labor force participation rate than others in the country, but are more likely to work in industries that do not offer employer-sponsored insurance (ESI). Medicaid and PeachCare for Kids fill an important gap by providing affordable health coverage to these working families.

Coverage Sources for Kids in Georgia, 2018






## Covering Parents Helps Children

Children are about twice as likely to have coverage in states that expanded Medicaid to cover more parents compared to children in states like Georgia that have not.

### **Latino Child Trends Over Time**




#### **Coverage Disparities Persist**

Child Uninsured Rates, 2008-2018

All children in Georgia are significantly more likely to be uninsured compared to the national average. Latino children make up 14.8% of the child population in Georgia. Coverage disparities between Latino children and other children in Georgia narrowed from 2008 to 2016. Between 2016 and 2018, the uninsured rate went in the wrong direction for all children in the state and coverage disparities widened.



#### Older Children are More Likely to be Uninsured

Latino Child Uninsured Rates in Georgia by Age, 2016 and 2018

The uninsured rate for Latino children in Georgia increased across all age groups between 2016 and 2018, and the uninsured rate goes up as children age. The uninsured rate increased significantly for the oldest age group, leaving a staggering 1 in 4 Latino teens in Georgia uninsured by 2018. Although over 93.5% of Georgia's Latino children are U.S. citizens, anti-immigrant rhetoric may lead parents to not enroll or renew their children's coverage out of fear.



# Families in All Income Groups Struggle to Access Coverage

Latino Child Uninsured Rates in Georgia by Census Poverty Threshold, 2016 and 2018

The uninsured rate for Latino children in Georgia goes down as income goes up. The uninsured rate increased significantly for the lowest income group, reaching 19.7% in 2018. These data show that children in families earning less than 250% of the poverty threshold (about \$50,600 for a family of 3) are struggling to access affordable coverage. The disproportionate job losses among Latinos during the COVID-19 pandemic could result in even more coverage losses.

# Top Georgia Counties and Congressional Districts with the Most Uninsured Latino Children, 2018

Counties and Congressional districts with large Latino child populations are more likely to have large numbers of uninsured Latino children, but state and local policies have an impact on the coverage rates.

# **Policy Recommendations**

**Health coverage is more important than ever.** Any prior gains must be preserved especially as the economy falters. Some states have laid the groundwork to protect children by enacting policies to cover as many children as possible with more straightforward enrollment and renewal processes. The growth of Georgia's Latino population is more recent than in some other states, giving state policymakers a unique opportunity to reverse these trends and lay a solid foundation for covering more children as this population increases by:







Adopting 12 months continuous coverage in Medicaid and PeachCare for Kids



Adopting Medicaid and Peach Care for lawfully present children



Covering all children regardless of citizenship status



Conducting culturally and linguistically competent outreach
