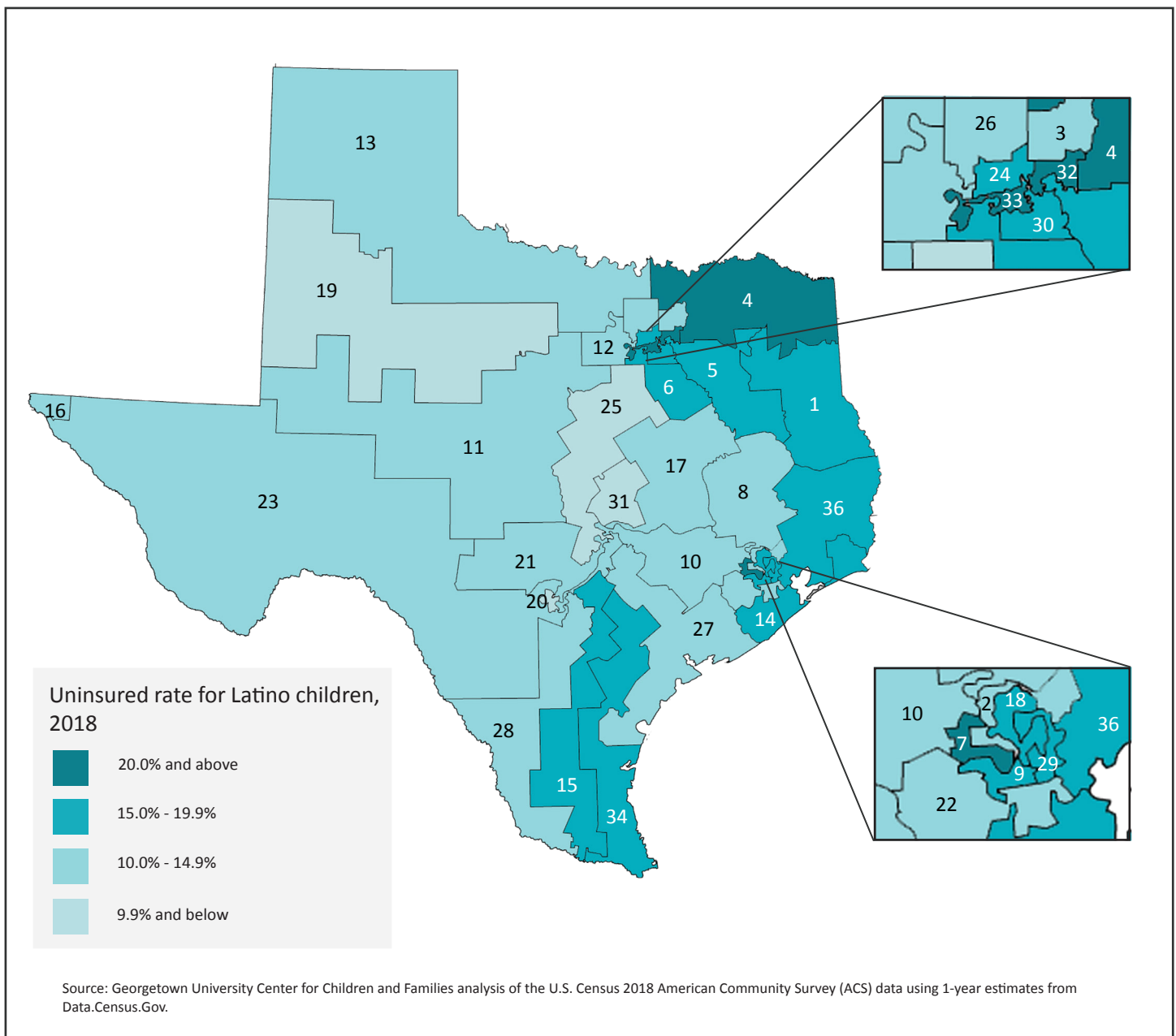


## Uninsured Rates for Latino Children Vary Across Texas

In Texas, the uninsured rate for children overall is higher than the national average (11.1% vs. 5.2%). Additionally, Latino children are almost twice as likely to be uninsured than other children in the state (14.8% vs. 7.6%). Counties and Congressional districts with large Latino child populations are more likely to have large numbers of uninsured Latino children, but state and local policies have an impact on the coverage rates. In Texas, District 31 (Round Rock) has the lowest Latino child uninsured rate at 5.9%, whereas 24.8% of Latino children are uninsured in District 32 (Dallas). Improving culturally and linguistically competent outreach in areas with high uninsured rates could help reach more Latino children.
