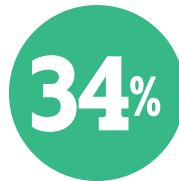


Medicaid is Vital to Hawaii's Children

Medicaid, or Hawaii QUEST Integration, is a public health insurance program designed to help people who otherwise could not afford health coverage.

Medicaid is a lifeline to children and families in Hawaii and is built with children's unique needs in mind.

34% of people enrolled in Medicaid in Hawaii are children



Medicaid pays for 34% of Hawaii births

Helps ensure access to critical prenatal care, maternity care, and postpartum services.



Medicaid covers 45% of all Hawaii children

Insures children in low-income families and nearly all children in foster care.



Medicaid covers 31% of children in Hawaii with special health care needs

Provides medical, behavioral health, and long term care for children with special health care needs and disabilities.



Medicaid is the largest source of federal funding for mental health services

Supports mental and behavioral health treatment for children, adolescents, and adults.

HAWAII QUEST INTEGRATION IS VITAL TO HAWAII'S CHILDREN



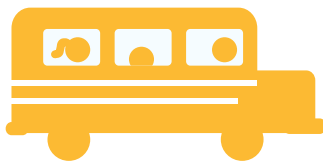
The federal government contributes \$1.48 to Medicaid for every \$1 Hawaii invests.



53% of federal funding sent to Hawaii is for Medicaid, which is about \$2.4 billion annually.
