Medicaid, or KanCare, is a public health insurance program designed to help people who otherwise could not afford health coverage.

Medicaid is a lifeline to children and families in Kansas and is built with children's unique needs in mind.

Medicaid pays for 31% of Kansas births

Helps ensure access to critical prenatal care, maternity care, and postpartum services.



Medicaid covers 31% of all Kansas children

Insures children in low-income families and nearly all children in foster care.



Medicaid covers 46% of children in Kansas with special health care needs

Provides medical, behavioral health, and long term care for children with special health care needs and disabilities.



Medicaid is the largest source of federal funding for mental health services

Supports mental and behavioral health treatment for children, adolescents, and adults.

The federal government contributes \$1.54 to Medicaid for every \$1 Kansas invests.



46% of federal funding sent to Kansas is for Medicaid, which is about \$3.6 billion annually.
