

Medicaid is Vital to Rhode Island's Children

Medicaid, or Rhode Island Medical Assistance (MA), is a public health insurance program designed to help people who otherwise could not afford health coverage.

Medicaid is a lifeline to children and families in Rhode Island and is built with children's unique needs in mind.

32% of people enrolled in Medicaid in Rhode Island are children



Medicaid pays for 43% of Rhode Island births

Helps ensure access to critical prenatal care, maternity care, and postpartum services.



Medicaid covers 37% of all Rhode Island children

Insures children in low-income families and nearly all children in foster care.



Medicaid covers 47% of children in Rhode Island with special health care needs

Provides medical, behavioral health, and long term care for children with special health care needs and disabilities.



Medicaid is the largest source of federal funding for mental health services

Supports mental and behavioral health treatment for children, adolescents, and adults.

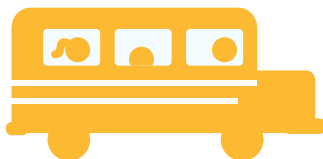
The federal government contributes \$1.35 to Medicaid for every \$1 Rhode Island invests.



32% of federal funding sent to Rhode Island is for Medicaid, which is about \$1.8 billion annually.
