


# Medicaid is Vital to South Dakota

South Dakota Medicaid is a public health insurance program designed to help people who otherwise could not afford health coverage.

Medicaid is a state-federal partnership, which means that federal and state funds jointly finance South Dakota Medicaid.

## MEDICAID IS VITAL TO SOUTH DAKOTA'S BUDGET



The federal government contributes **\$1.04** to Medicaid for every **\$1** South Dakota invests.



**28%** of federal funding sent to South Dakota is for Medicaid, which is about \$811 million annually.

## Federal funding for Medicaid is critical to health care in South Dakota



### Medicaid pays for 46% of births in South Dakota

Helps ensure access to critical prenatal care, maternity care, and postpartum services.



### Medicaid covers 30% of all South Dakota children

Insures children in low-income families, children with special health care needs, and children in foster care.



### Medicaid pays for the care of 49% of nursing home residents in South Dakota

Provides critical nursing home and community-based services for seniors and people with disabilities.



### Medicaid covers mental health services in South Dakota

Nationally, Medicaid is the largest single source of funding for mental health and substance use care.

## FEDERAL MEDICAID CUTS WOULD:

- 1 Do nothing to lower health care costs** or improve quality and access to care.
- 2 Devastate state budgets**, putting other priorities like K-12 funding at risk.
- 3 Undermine financial stability of the health system**, especially rural hospitals and community clinics.
- 4 Jeopardize health coverage** for millions of children and families, seniors, and people with disabilities.
